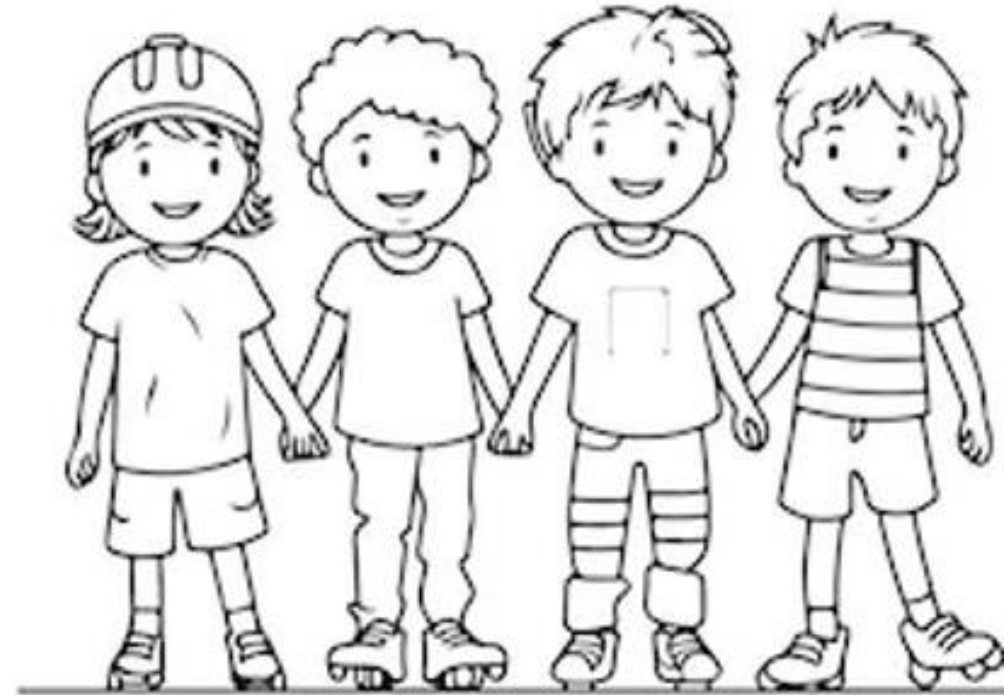

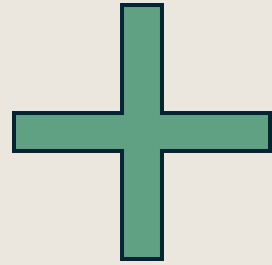

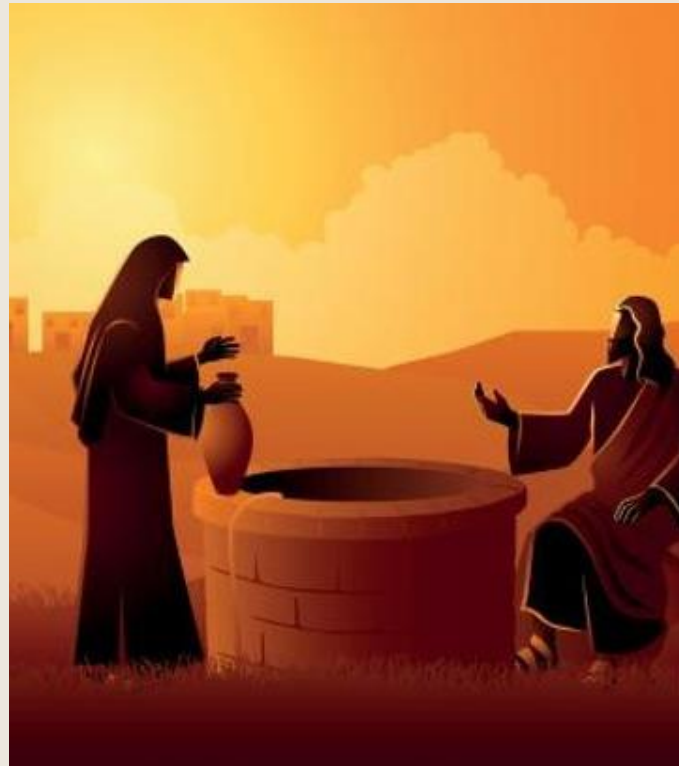

Wondering Questions

Genuine wondering questions are those that that we don't know the answer to.

“I wonder what your favourite part of the story is?”

“I wonder if there anything in the story you don't like or you don't understand?”

“I wonder what this story tells us about God?”
