As children's ministry leaders, we have the privilege of sharing the big story of God with children. It's important to teach Bible stories accurately, in an age-appropriate way. But how do we handle the tricky stories? How do we present Scripture in a way that invites children to encounter God for themselves without over-explaining or over simplifying it? In this workshop we will explore how we can faithfully teach the whole story of the Bible, fostering curiosity, wonder, and deep a love for God's Word. Facilitated by Julie McKinnon, CCCNZ Children and Family Ministries	will outline three answers to this question - answers proposed by Christian thinkers through the centuries - and consider what value these approaches may have for sharing the message of "Christ crucified" today.	This workshop explores how Scripture encourages us to allow the Cross to shape our leadership with love, integrity and accountability. Are our methods enhancing our eldership oversight or just offering superficial transparency? Do our church policies reflect the grace and justice of the cross, or do they expose hypocrisy? As Christian leaders, how do we balance our commitment to God's Word with modern challenges, including government policies that may conflict with our faith?
