

The Bible tells a single story

The story is about Jesus



The Story Is About Jesus

1. Look for what God is doing

- What is God doing for his people in this story?
- How does God do the same for us in and through Jesus?
- So what? How does believing this good news change how we live?

2. Look for who God is

- What does the passage teach us about who God is?
- How is this aspect of God revealed most fully in Jesus?
- So what? How does believing this good news change how we live?

The Big Story

The Bible tells a single story

The story is about Jesus

 Teaching stories in isolation can distort their meaning



Discuss:

Did you learn the Bible as a collection of stories or as one big story about God and his plan?

How does your experience impact your understanding of the gospel today?

Does your children's ministry's curriculum point to Jesus in every session? How can you ensure this happens?



Accuracy and Age-Appropriateness

Stick to the core message

Avoid 'tidying up' stories



Activity

Talk about how you would tell the story to your age group.

(preschool, primary, intermediate)

What questions would you ask?

What kind of activities might help the children explore the story?



Letting Scripture Speak

Wonder

Open-ended questions

Listen



Meaning is embedded in the story itself... listeners hear and interpret the story as it connects with their own understanding, experience and need. For this reason, explaining what a story means may short-circuit its impact for learners.
